Celebrating 30 Years of Service



The 2025/26 season marks a significant milestone for Mandurah Surf Life Saving Club as we proudly celebrate 30 years of service to our community.

The Mandurah Surf Life Saving Club is incredibly proud of its history and its standing within the Mandurah and Peel region. For three decades, our members have contributed countless volunteer hours, embodying the values of service, dedication, leadership and community spirit that remain at the heart of the club today.

As we reflect on this journey, we recognise not only how far the club has come, but also the determination, resilience and commitment of the people who built it.

EARLY DEVELOPMENT AND FORMATION

In the mid-1990s, Surf Life Saving Western Australia undertook public forums to explore the absence of a surf life saving presence in Mandurah. From this process, a steering group was formed to establish a local club, and in 1996 the Peel Surf Life Saving Club was officially established. The club commenced operations at Halls Head, operating as a junior development club. In its early days, patrols were conducted at Doddi's Beach, alongside nipper activities and foundational training programs. Membership quickly grew from 52 members in its first season to 187, and then approximately 200 members by the 1998/99 season, reflecting strong community interest and engagement. During the 1997/98 season, the club requested permanent facilities at Halls Head Beach. Council approved temporary storage solutions in the form of sea containers, which later expanded to support the club's growing operational needs.

GROWTH, RELOCATION AND EARLY CHALLENGES

In 1999, as the club continued to grow, it relocated to San Remo to better support its expanding membership and development pathway. Around this time, the club also explored relocation opportunities, including a proposal to move to Port Bouvard. However, the expansion of membership and operational requirements ultimately reinforced the need for a more suitable long-term base.

In 2000, operating under the name Mandurah Surf Life Saving Club, the club briefly relocated to Port Bouvard. Unfortunately, membership declined significantly during this period, falling to around 40 members, and by the 2002 season the club entered a period of recession.

Despite these challenges, the club was resurrected and reformed in 2003 at Town Beach, marking the beginning of a rebuild phase. Membership slowly increased as the club re-established itself, before relocating once again to San Remo. During this time, a breakaway group formed Port Bouvard Surf Life Saving Club (December 2003), reflecting the evolving structure of surf life saving in the region.

When rebuilding efforts were underway, the club operated with fewer than 40 members and extremely limited resources. Equipment was stored in private homes, and training and assessment activities were conducted in backyards and on the beach. Sunday patrols and activities were supported by volunteers transporting gear manually, demonstrating extraordinary commitment during this rebuilding phase.

During this period, engagement with Council and Surf Life Saving WA was re-established to explore long-term facility options. It was agreed that a mobile and flexible patrol model could operate across Mandurah's extensive coastline, including Halls Head through to Madora Bay, with future opportunities for outpost patrols.

Following extensive assessment and community consultation, Eros Reserve, San Remo was approved by the City of Mandurah in July 2005 as the permanent site for the club's future home.

REBUILDING MOMENTUM AND MAJOR PROGRESS

The 2005 season marked a turning point for the club, with significant growth across membership, turnover and equipment despite the absence of permanent facilities. Membership exceeded 200, and operations continued to be delivered from a combination of private homes and temporary arrangements.

During this time, a storage shed was constructed at Eros Reserve in 2007 to support operational needs.

However, the journey toward a permanent clubhouse remained challenging. Grant applications were submitted, time passed, and progress was slow. The impact of the Global Financial Crisis further complicated funding opportunities, and momentum at times became difficult to maintain.

Despite these challenges, the determination of club leadership and volunteers never wavered.

In 2009, a significant breakthrough occurred when Lotterywest approved a \$450,000 grant, followed shortly after by confirmation from the Department of Sport and Recreation for \$888,000. This renewed energy and belief in the project.

At a Council meeting on 16 June 2009, approval was granted to progress the design of the club's future facility. By the end of 2010, the club had secured approximately \$1.8 million in total funding across three grants, enabling the project to move forward.

Building plans were finalised and planning approval was granted in 2011.

A NEW ERA – CLUBHOUSE DEVELOPMENT

With funding secured and approvals in place, construction of the clubhouse at Eros Reserve commenced in 2012. The facility officially became operational in April 2013, marking a defining moment in the club's history and the beginning of a new era for members, volunteers and the wider community.

The clubhouse provided a permanent base for patrol operations, training, education and community engagement, significantly strengthening the club's capacity to deliver surf life saving services across the region.

30 YEARS OF SERVICE AND COMMUNITY IMPACT

Over the past 30 years, Mandurah Surf Life Saving Club has grown into a strong, inclusive and community-driven organisation. Our members have played a vital role in keeping our beaches safe, developing lifesaving skills, and fostering a culture of teamwork, leadership and camaraderie.

The 30th Anniversary celebrations brought together past and present members, Life Members, sponsors and the wider community to reflect on this journey. It was a meaningful opportunity to honour those who have contributed, celebrate achievements, and acknowledge the collective effort that has shaped the club.

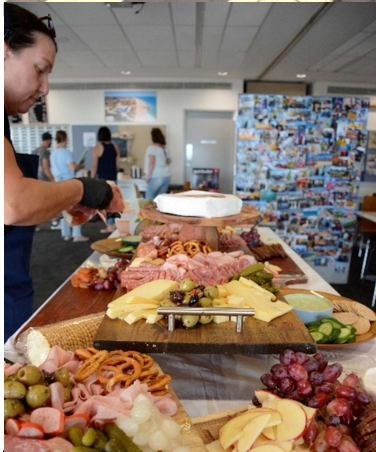

This season marked a milestone 30 years for Mandurah SLSC we continue to grow from those humble beginnings into a vibrant community club. We held a 30-year celebration at the club on 29 March 2026, it was nice to have some of our past members attend include a past Mandurah Mayor and SLSWA President who were involved in the early days.

The club patrolled beaches from Madora to Town Beach on Sundays and public holidays and we patrolled at abalone fishing days at Halls Head. We have plans and partial funding for an annex at town beach that will allow us to grow our patrols at this busy beach. We are applying for \$195,000 in additional funding so this facility can be constructed and put into use as soon as possible.

LIFE SAVING REPORT

Director of Lifesaving, Clayton Moseley

As the Director of Lifesaving for the Mandurah Surf Lifesaving Club, I am proud to present this year's report, detailing our achievements and activities over the past year. Our commitment to ensuring the safety of beachgoers has been unwavering, and I would like to highlight our key accomplishments.

Patrol Operations

- Total Patrol Hours: 2765 hours of dedicated beach patrols.
- Preventative Actions: A remarkable 185 preventative actions were undertaken to ensure beach safety and educate the public.
- First Aid Responses: Our team successfully handled 16 first aid incidents, showcasing our readiness to respond to emergencies.
- Rescues: We performed 5 rescues, demonstrating our lifesaving capabilities and vigilance.

Training and Development

- New Bronze Medallion Holders: We proudly welcomed 9 new Bronze Medallion holders, enhancing our lifesaving team's skills.
- Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC): Additionally, 8 new SRC holders joined our ranks, further strengthening our volunteer base.
- New Silver Medallion Patrol Captains: we were lucky enough to have 3 leaders qualify for this role.
- Silver Medallion IRB driver: we saw 2 new IRB drivers come through this year.



Community Engagement and Events

This year, our club played a vital role in multiple community events, providing essential water safety services:

- Mandurah Interclub Triathlon
- Port Bouvard's Cut to Club Swim
- Rotary Club Duck Race
- Beats Under the Bridge
- Mandurah Bridge Opening

We also supported local schools by providing water safety for:

- Mandurah Catholic College Beach Days

Special Programs and Initiatives

- **Abalone Sessions:** We covered all abalone sessions this year, leading to a noticeable reduction in rescues required during these events.
- **Volunteer Engagement:** This year saw a significant increase in both the number of volunteers and volunteer hours, reflecting our club's growing community involvement.
- **New Lifesaving Equipment:** We welcomed a new Isuzu DMAX Ute, enhancing our operational efficiency and response times.
- **Volunteer Support:** To further encourage participation, we introduced free snacks and drinks for volunteers, fostering a supportive and engaging environment.

SURF SPORTS REPORT

Director of Surf Sports, Sunita Gaby

Surf Sports is such an important part of our club. It builds lifesaving skills through fun, fitness, teamwork, and community. It's made up of our coaches, athletes, water safety crew, and parent helpers.

Our competition season kicked off with the Endurance Championships in October 2025, where Mandurah was represented by both masters and a nipper competitor. We hope more members compete at this fun event in 2026. We then competed at the Peel Nipper Regional Championships, a Youth Carnival at Sorrento and of course our favourite events in January 2026 — WA Country Champs & Country Carnival in Albany — where more than 40 competitors from nippers, youth and masters proudly represented MHSLS.

MHSLS have 0 competition officials currently, we need up to 4 members to complete their officials course to help keep carnivals running into the future. In 2026 SLSWA introduced a requirement to provide a club official to surf sports carnivals when there are over 15 club competitors attending.

A huge thank you to our Head Coach Chris for growing our ocean ski program, which has seen fantastic increases in youth and masters participation this season. We also had strong numbers across all training programs, including more than 30 nippers, youth, and masters regularly attending swim training with coach Sunita. Next season we hope to have a new swimming coach to take our coach numbers to 3. In addition, we have social ski paddling and training collectives for members with their SRC or Bronze Medallion, these sessions are not coach lead.

This season the club purchased new boards in foam and fibreglass for nippers. We also invested \$2,750 in a second-hand race mal and second-hand skis (2 singles and 2 doubles). To maintain our craft stock as it ages or is damaged we will look to sponsors to invest in this next season.

The 2025/26 Surf Sports Awards celebrated not only points and performances, but also the members who were nominated by their fellow club members for their contribution and spirit throughout the season. I am incredibly proud and grateful to this outstanding group and congratulate all those nominated.

As director of surf sports in my second term, it has been another fantastic season enjoying the positive culture at MHSLS and successfully collaborating with the other pillars.

We host the Peel Nipper Regional Carnival in January 2027 and I look forward to developing a sub-committee to make this a successful event for our club.





YOUTH REPORT

One of the most significant achievements of the year was the continued development and delivery of The RICK Project, our youth-led coastal safety incursion program. Delivered by trained youth lifesavers, the program reached several thousand primary school students and provided practical, age-appropriate beach safety education. Watching our youth step into leadership roles, confidently present to classrooms, and make a tangible impact in the community has been a standout highlight of the season. The growth of this project has been something the entire club can be proud of, with aspirations to expand its reach further across the Peel region and beyond.

Youth camp was once again a major highlight of the season. Across several full days, members participated in team challenges, quiz nights, outdoor adventures, and social activities that encouraged connection and collaboration. From laser tag around the campsite and sunset beach sessions, to shared meals and late-night laughter, the camp created memories that will last well beyond the season. Activities such as the bush tucker tour and canoe expedition challenged youth to step outside their comfort zones, rely on one another, and embrace new experiences together.

The RICK Project

Rescue Information for Coastal Kids

Mandurah Surf Life Saving Club, Beach Safety Program



The RICK Project is a youth-led beach safety education program designed to equip primary school students with essential coastal safety knowledge. Delivered by trained youth lifesavers, the program teaches children how to identify RIP currents, understand lifesaving flag and hand signals, interpret beach signage, recognize BEN signs, and practice sun safety. Created in memory of Ricky Harris, a cherished MHSLSCLSC member of our club family who tragically drowned after rescuing two children from a RIP current, the initiative transforms personal loss into a powerful community safety legacy. Developed by our Youth Director, Youth Captains, and Ricky's family, the program has become a cornerstone of local coastal education.

The RICK Project is unique in its youth-designed and youth-delivered model. Rather than relying on adult instructors, the program empowers young lifesavers to lead sessions, making the content more relatable and engaging for children. The program uses interactive demonstrations, real-world lifesaving tools, and scenario-based learning to ensure students retain critical safety information. This peer-to-peer approach is both innovative and highly effective, fostering leadership skills while delivering lifesaving education in a fun, memorable way.

The initiative was shaped through direct consultation with local schools, teachers, parents, community leaders, SLSWA, and club members to ensure it met the specific needs of coastal communities. Feedback from early pilot sessions informed refinements to content, delivery style, and accessibility. The program responds to a clear community need: improving children's understanding of RIP currents and beach hazards, which remain leading contributors to coastal drownings. By bringing lifesaving education directly into classrooms, The RICK Project removes barriers to access and ensures all children, regardless of background, receive vital safety knowledge. The program has also received strong community endorsement, including: Mentions in State Parliament, recognising its contribution to coastal safety and youth leadership; and public praise from schools and community leaders on social media, highlighting its value and impact. These acknowledgements reflect the program's deep connection with the community and its responsiveness to local needs.

Students gain confidence, hazard awareness, and practical skills that can prevent drownings. Teachers consistently report high engagement and improved student understanding of beach safety. The broader community benefits from a more informed generation of young beachgoers, reducing risk and strengthening coastal resilience. The initiative has also brought significant recognition to Mandurah SLSC, including: SLSWA Awards of Excellence Winner: Community Engagement of the Year, City of Mandurah Community Spirit Award, acknowledging the program's outstanding dedication, community involvement and personal attitude; and Zonta Club of Peel Special Recognition Award, celebrating the leadership and contribution of the young women involved in the project. These honours demonstrate the program's positive social impact and alignment with SLSA's strategic priorities of saving lives, empowering youth, and building healthy communities.

The RICK Project is built on meaningful collaboration between MHSLSCLSC youth, local schools, community leaders and families. Schools partner closely with the club to schedule sessions, provide feedback, and integrate content into their curriculum. The involvement of Ricky's family and the club's youth leadership team ensures authenticity, community ownership, and shared commitment to honouring Ricky's legacy. These partnerships have been essential to the program's success and ongoing growth.

The program is designed for long-term sustainability through youth leadership succession, documented lesson plans, and ongoing training for new youth lifesavers. Its structure is simple, adaptable, and cost-effective, making it easy for other Surf Life Saving clubs to adopt. With minor customization, The RICK Project could be scaled statewide (then nationwide), providing a consistent, youth-driven approach to coastal safety education across Western Australia. Its strong community support and proven impact position it well for future expansion.

I am pleased to present the Administration Report for the 2025–26 season, reflecting another positive year of progress, growth and strong operational support across the Club.

Once again, the Administration portfolio has benefited from the ongoing commitment and support of our team. In particular, I would like to acknowledge Victoria Higgins, whose continued dedication to membership and registrations has been invaluable. 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act WA. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Taxation

Mandurah Surf Life Saving Club Inc has been endorsed by the Australian Tax Office as a charity, and is eligible for the following concessions:

GST Concession

FBT Exemption

Income Taxation Exemption

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash on Hand

Notes to the Financial Statements

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Financial Assets

Notes to the Financial Statements

Investments in financial assets are initially recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at fair value, which is equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through an equity reserve.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Economic Dependency

The ongoing operation of the services provided by the Club and the ability to continue as a going concern is dependent upon the continued receipt of funding from sponsorship/fundraising events and upon the continued support of its members.

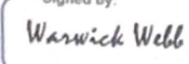
